

True Tribal: Contemporary Expressions of Ancestral Tattoo Practices Opens at the Museum of Vancouver March 28, 2024

Embodied Mark Making a Reclamation of Indigenous Culture

<u>For Immediate Release: February 14, 2024</u> — True Tribal: Contemporary Expressions of Ancestral Tattoo Practices explores 30-plus years of Indigenous tattooing from around the world and the artists who are reconnecting with traditional skin marking practices. The revival of ancestral tattoo designs and motifs, the re-envisioning of meaning and protocols, and the re-fashioning of ancestral application methods is part of Indigenous peoples' efforts to reclaim their lands, cultures and identities.

Tattoo artists **Tristen Jenni Sanderson** (Woodland and Plains Cree), **Terje Koloamatangi** (Tongan), **Nolan Malbeuf** (Métis), **Mo-Naga** (Uipo Naga), **Julie Paama-Pengelly** (Māori), **Gordon Sparks** (Mi'kmaq), **Nathalie Standingcloud** (Cherokee) and **Dion Kaszas** (Nlaka'pamux) use contemporary technologies to build upon ancestral design conventions as seen on ancestral belongings. Their work gives power back to Indigenous people to think through and theorize their own world and life views while taking away the colonial tools that separated them from the visual language of skin markings.

Portraits of people with the artists' tattoos will be exhibited alongside cultural belongings that act as a visual dictionary for the markings, as well as projections, blood impression paintings and augmented reality (AR). The AR app will allow visitors to view tattoo designs created by the *True Tribal* artists expanded in the exhibition space with the use of their own devices.

True Tribal is co-curated by artist and podcaster Dion Kaszas and curator Mireille Bourgeois, in collaboration with the curatorial team at the Museum of Vancouver and its collection of cultural belongings. The project is co-managed by IOTA Institute, a Nova Scotia based art collective and creative agency. True Tribal will be on display at the Museum of Vancouver starting March 28, 2024 with an opening reception on March 27th.
